Number of Undocumented Students in the LACCD and at Each College

- In Fall 2016 there were 11,501 undocumented students enrolled in LACCD colleges
 - 6,534 Credit Students
 - 4,967 Non-credit students
- This is about 7.4% of all enrolled students
 - 4.6% of Credit students
 - 35.7% of Non-credit students

Demographic & Enrollment Characteristics of Undocumented and All LACCD Students

Undocumented credit students

- **Overwhelmingly Hispanic** (82% compared to 56% for the District)
- **Tend to be younger** (69% under 25 years old compared to 59% for the District)
- **Gender balance mirrors the overall student population** (58% female compared to 57% for the District)
- **Enrolled part time (79%) at a higher rate** when compared to all students (75%)

Undocumented non-credit students

- **Overwhelmingly Hispanic** (80% compared to 61% for the District)
- **Tend to be older** (79% are between 25–54 years old compared to 56% for the District)
- **Tend to be female** (76% compared to 72% for the District)

Academic Outcomes of Undocumented and All LACCD Students

- Undocumented students had slightly higher **successful course completion rates** (68%) compared to all LACCD students (67%)
- Undocumented students had slightly lower **fall to spring persistence** (85%) compared to all LACCD students (87%)
- Milestones were generally higher for undocumented students compared to all LACCD students
- A much lower proportion of undocumented students **transferred** (2%) compared to all LACCD students (8%)
